Report on the Public meeting held to discuss the effects of global warming on the Ruawai area.

This meeting was held on the 15h October in the Ruawai Hall and was well attended. It soon became clear that residents are well aware that global warming will affect us all in some way. There was a genuine interest in the information supplied by both the Regional Council and Kaipara District Council.



The information was well presented and informative and I feel that both the Residents and the Council representatives left the meeting with a better understanding of the situation here in Ruawai.

RPDG has since had a meeting to debrief and analyse what we saw as the important points coming from the meeting. We will be sending a letter to both councils as a result. The paragraph below will be part of that letter and we feel that it is what residents feel is the most important issue. "It is felt that the integrity of our Flood protection infrastructure is the overriding concern of the meeting. This includes the future raising and strengthening of the stop banks and possible pumping stations as water levels rise.

Confidence in our flood protection infrastructure is essential for continued investment and development in our area."

It is possible that another public meeting will be called early next year as more information comes to hand. **Bruce Crompton, RPDG Chairman**

Councillor's Corner - The Big Stuff

Now that we are well into our first year of the Long Term Plan, Council has been freed up to look into some of the bigger picture matters that we deal with. What follows is an update on some of the main ones:

Representation Review – At least once every six years all Councils must do what is called a Representation Review. In this we look at the way in which our community elects its Council representatives to check that the process gives the best representation around the table. Part of this is whether the numbers of representatives are spread evenly round the district by population numbers. Also of importance is the way in which distinct communities of interest are represented. Based on this, Council resolved to create a new ward, the Kaiwaka Mangawhai ward. As is allowed in the statutory process, it is my understanding that this decision has likely been appealed by at least one member of the community. This means that the decision will now be made by the Local Government Commission based on the evidence generated during the process. We should know the outcome by April 2019 and that will define how the 2019 election is run.

Roading Efficiency Project

It is no surprise to anyone in the District that our roads are not in good shape. Many years of underfunding has contributed to a significant back log of work. Our new Roading Contract is helping as it includes better auditing and performance standards. However, to progress things further we have been working with Equip, a division of Local Government New Zealand, to identify ways in which we may improve productivity even more and source additional funding where possible. This project has identified firstly that our new contract is strong and that our team under the umbrella of the Northern Transportation Alliance is working well but also that there may indeed be some opportunities for further funding. We are continuing these investigations.

Reviewing the Vices

We have been reviewing the bylaws pertaining to smoking, gambling venues and alcohol control areas. This has been an interesting exercise to be part of as it deals with important issues like the health of our communities and civil liberties, things which don't always align well on the face of things! These bylaws should be adopted by the end of the year. If you have taken the time to share your views in a submission, thank you!

District Plan Review

This was approved as part of the Long Term Plan and there has been significant work done internally to set out the scope. This is a vital project for our District as it sets out the rule book for what the development and environmental focus is for our District over the next ten years or so. Our current District Plan as written at a time when growth was not an issue for us. The Plan is now constraining our ability to respond well to growth and the changing nature of our communities. The review will include opportunities for everyone to have their say and I encourage you to come along to any community meetings that we host on the matter. We need to understand your aspirations for our District so that we can make the rules that support those.

Climate Change

Some of you will have attended the meeting held on climate change in Ruawai last month. Officers from NRC and KDC presented information about the risks of flooding to the Ruawai area. These are significant and will require action that is not business-as-usual over the next few years. It is my understanding that the community now wishes to set up a stakeholder group to co-ordinate our input back to Council to make sure that Ruawai's wishes are heard and help to define the response plans. Look out for more information from Ruawai Promotions and Development Group about the formation of this group.

Peoples Panel

Getting input from our community is vital to helping us make the right decisions. To ensure we get the widest possible range of views we have set up an online system where you register and then we send you questions from time to time asking for your views on things we need to make decisions on. Please do join the peoples panel by going to www.kaipara.govt.nz/panel.

Finally, as we head into the Christmas season, please have a happy holiday, enjoy the Christmas parade and the Stop-bank Walkway opening event, and take care of each other.

Ruawai Stopbank Walkway

The surface should be finished to a good standard from the first flood gate right through to Simpson's Road. Unfortunately the stretch from the wharf through to the first floodgate has not been dry enough to be worked so will not be finished in time for the opening but should be finished soon after that. In the meantime and certainly for the opening event we will be walking along Westlake Road up to the first floodgate. Keep an eye out for the new signs that are now in production. We have signs describing the history, technology and wildlife of the area. Sometimes, when you live somewhere it's easy to take things for granted. I encourage you to take a walk on our extraordinary stopbank and take the time to notice how incredible it really is; and how beautiful too! Thanks to the contractors who are doing the hard work getting our stopbank ready for this new activity. They are indeed being paid but mostly they have provided quotes that show their support. We have tried to use local contractors wherever possible to make sure this is a project for Ruawai, by Ruawai. I would like to thank my fellow members of the committee; Nicky Reid, Elaine Crompton, Ian Beattie, Dorothy and Jim Simpson, Stella Clyde and Roxanne Kelly. They have shown a commitment and enthusiasm for this project that has carried it from an idea (one that has been held in the community for many years) through to raising funds, organising contractors, designers and signage people and now to organising an exciting event for Ruawai. I look forward to seeing you at 9am (bikes) or 10am (walkers, runners and buggies) on 16 December, at the wharf. Don't forget to dress in a Christmas theme for a little fun! More about the Gazebo

The Ruawai Flats have a very unique history because this whole area was once an inhospitable swamp that flooded during a big spring tide and now it is one of the most productive areas of Northland. There is soon going to be a Photo Collection permanently installed in the Gazebo on the Ruawai Village Green, to tell the stories of how the Ruawai Flats and its community developed into what it is now – from the timber milling, maritime and drainage stories to the kumara and dairy industries. A sub-committee of the Ruawai Promotions and Development Group created the photo display to provide local information to tourists and to help locals feel proud of where we live. There will be a ribbon-cutting ceremony for the Photo Collection on December 12th at 6pm at the Village Green, followed by Carol Singing, Santa-on-the-Fire-Engine and lolly scramble. Please come along and bring your friends and family. The photo collection has also been compiled into a tourist book called "The Ruawai Flats – Our Story" and there will be a limited number of these available for purchase at the Opening Event. 


In the last couple of issues of the Ruawai Rambler we have mentioned new businesses and buildings in Ruawai. Here is an article about a well established business that is growing with the times. Thanks to Lorraine Littler, our new reporter, for supplying the article and photos. J.W.

Crompton Engineering, a growing business.

I recently spoke with Bruce Crompton, owner of Crompton Engineering, to find out a little about why he is adding an additional building to his business's location on Jellicoe Road.

It makes sense to begin by going back to 2 February 1976, when Bruce bought his business from Jim Lowther. He started out with just two staff members. The total area of his building was approximately 200 square metres. Back then, the biggest tractors were 50hp and his work mainly consisted of repairs and maintenance for kumara growers and farmers, and a small amount of manufacturing.



Tractor work had to be by appointment due to lack of lifting gear such as forklifts.

By 1986 tractors and machinery were starting to get bigger and because of the need for more space, he built the existing workshop.

Bruce has secured contracts over the years which have helped his business to grow. During the early years he was fortunate to secure a three year contract with Marsden B Power Station and with the oil refinery at Ruakaka undertaking fabrication work. This paved the way for more manufacturing work. Bruce did the steel work on the new Dargaville Bridge which was opened in 1988.

He also approached the former owner of PortStar Plastics when he heard he was looking for premises in Ruawai, to see if he would be interested in leasing some space. His offer was taken up and the first few years of operation of this other successful Ruawai business were from the back of Bruce's workshop.

Moving on to the present, tractors and machinery have continued to get bigger and so the need for more space has returned. Tractors can often be over 200hp these days and of course they are heavier as well. These days Bruce also gets to work on such equipment as rollers, levelers and floodgates. To cater for modern times there will soon be workshop space of 800 to 900 square metres. The new building addition will have a lifting facility inside which is now essential for engineering. There will be four bays to allow for better access. He plans on using the current area for manufacturing (kumara machinery etc), retail (pump sales etc) and future development. There are now four staff members working at the business.

Bruce says that there is always a need to invest back into any business in order for it to survive. He wants to ensure our town carries on and he appreciates the support of the local and surrounding communities.



Real Estate Update




New Boat Hits The Water
