Kumara 2017

I imagine that most people who have purchased Kumara this season have noticed that they are very expensive when compared to last year. From a 'growing' point of view 2017 has been extremely trying. This comment also is true for most field crops throughout New Zealand. The season started badly in August/ September during the process of putting down beds. Weather was cold and wet. This is not usually a problem but these conditions persisted for some weeks with several periods of heavy rain. As a result many growers lost beds causing a later-than-usual start to planting. In fact, ground conditions were still very wet for planting in October and early November. However, as the weather settled down in November no one could have foreseen that the 'weather gods' had not finished for the season. From a flood situation we went straight into a drought until late February followed by more heavy rain at the beginning of harvest. Two downpours of around 100mm in two weeks was enough to make the harvest a very difficult time for all concerned. At the time of writing, I understand that some growers are still finishing off harvesting. The result of this is a much lower yield for 2017. The percentages that I am hearing are about 40-50 percent reduced yield compared to last year. This is borne out by my own crop. All part of the joys of planting. Bruce Crompton

Many of you will have seen Jack around town on his mobility scooter. What you may not realise is that Jack

Jack's Family History

Like many New Zealanders, Jack has an interesting family history and he has told me a bit about it. The name Driffill has it's roots in France. Jack's ancestors went from France to England. His grandfather, Thomas Driffill was a sailor, who arrived in Auckland on the 23rd December 1864 on the three masted bark called Maori. He decided he liked New Zealand and jumped ship.



He went to Thames to join the gold rush. He invested in a goldmine which unfortunately went bust. He then went to work in a kauri timber mill and must have done alright because in the 1860's he bought Slipper Island which is located off the east coast of the Coromandel. He lived and farmed there for 40 years, sold the island in 1906 and moved to Auckland. Jack's father, Arthur Thomas Driffill was born in 1883. He became a bridge builder and among other things built the twin bridges near Tangiteroria



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Update from Councillor Anna Curnow - Planning, Planning and More Planning

Your Council has been busy firming up the Annual Plan for the 2017/18 financial year with consultation meetings around the district. At our last meeting we considered the outcomes from that consultation and expect to adopt the Annual Plan at our June meeting.

At the May Council meeting work towards the Long-Term Plan 2018/28 began with a session, facilitated by Council's former Acting Chief Executive Jill McPherson, to identify the collective vision for the District. Some interesting discussions were had but we came to a generally unified view which is being worked up into a draft vision document. This will inform the modelling that officers do to help us set the direction in the LTP. We expect consultation on the LTP to start in some form later in the year or early next year. The LTP must be adopted by 30 June 2018.

Also at the May meeting, Council considered the draft Waste Minimisation Plan which will be circulated to the community for consultation soon. This Plan is of particular importance to Ruawai as our current service provider is Kaipara Refuse Ltd, a Ruawai business that creates employment opportunities for the Kaurilands community members. I encourage you to look out for this plan and have a think about how we might improve our treatment of solid waste (rubbish and recycling).

Work is also progressing towards a Dargaville Town Plan, along similar lines to the approach taken with Mangawhai. However while the critical issue in Mangawhai is managing growth, it would be fair to say that

the key issue in Dargaville is promoting growth and economic activity. Mayor Gent explained at a meeting in Dargaville recently that the Dargaville Town Plan is based on the "hub and spoke" model in which you stimulate one centre with spinoffs benefitting other towns nearby. You might like to consider how Ruawai can benefit from growth in Dargaville.

Finally, the Ruawai Stopbank Walking and Cycleway progresses with a large scale funding application being prepared by the Ruawai Promotions Development Group, Sub-committee. We are hopeful that the project could be well underway by later this year, funding permitting.

I do believe that the west side of the Kaipara District could start to see some increased activity. Real estate activity has already grown dramatically and with the launch of the Ancient Kauri Trail, we should start to see an increase in visitor numbers. These things don't happen quickly but with persistence and commitment they do happen eventually.

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Youth Doctor Clinic - Ruawai College

Students have the opportunity to see a Doctor at Ruawai College.

Once a week during the School Term a Doctors Clinic is held on Mondays from 12.45pm-1.30pm Dr. Bev Hopkins from Dargaville Medical Centre is the main person running the Clinics. Students need to book in advance (through the College Office). The appointments are FREE to the students, thanks to funding from the Manaia Primary Health Organisation 'Service to Improve Access Fund'. This is an annual contestable funding pool that competes against other projects. We are pleased funding has been obtained again to keep the Clinics running, but usage is low. Last year Dr. Hopkins had only 28 appointments at Ruawai College with 4 DNA (did not attend). The funding for the Youth Doctor Clinics allows for up to four

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Rugby Tour to Australia

Kia Ora Community. After 2yrs. of hard work fundraising and trainings, our Ruawai Under 13's rugby team made the familiar trek across the ditch for the 37th year of the Ruawai vs Northern Barbarians (formally Cherrybrook/Beecroft) rugby match. We had a 3- game 9- day tour which was a lot to squeeze in!

We had started out with a team of 18 but due to unforeseen circumstances we were left with 15 boys to take on Tour. We had 3 boys come down from Dargaville being Daniel Grbin, Rico Connelly and Phillip Hutchinson. These boys fitted in well with the local boys and really knitted as a team. Our coaches, Chris Hickey and Jeremy Hutchinson, did a great job in

We had a great first day sightseeing around Sydney and taking in the sights and getting a tad wet on the Jet boat ride around the Harbour! We then headed off to the Blue Mountains to stay for a couple nights. The 2017 Firefighter Sky Tower Stair Challenge was something we, Renee Gatehouse, Natalia Partridge and Jo Forsythe, were keen to give a go. The local mountains (we are so spoilt) provided us with some great training and certainly got us ready for this challenge. We met up on Saturday 13th May with around 900 fellow firefighters (from around the regions and also overseas) to give this our "best shot". So, with nerves aplenty, kit on and the timer counting down, before we knew it we were heading for the top. With no expectations, but just the



determination to finish, we all completed the challenge in under 20 minutes and even had air left over in our tanks. 51 Flights of stairs, 1,103 individual steps, up to 25kg on our backs and we did it! A worthwhile cause. The 2017 Firefighter Sky Tower Stair Challenge raised a record-breaking \$1.25 million for Leukaemia & Blood Cancer New Zealand. 




COMPUTER VIRUS - HOW TO PREVENT AND RECOGNISE

A necessary evil of computer systems is having to install protection against virus attacks. There are lots of choices for different products that will do the job; some are good, some are not. Most generally work well but if they have been installed by the average person or from the shop, you will usually find that everything possible has been installed on your computer. Half of it you will not need or want and generally will slow your computer down drastically.

A virus usually arrives through an attachment on your emails. Hence DO NOT OPEN any email attachments from anyone you do not know or aren't expecting. OR if you get a phone call from an unknown person stating they work for Microsoft/Windows – DO NOT under any circumstances do anything they say. Tell them you don't have a computer and they will leave you alone. The upside is: if you are running Windows 7,8, or 10 or any version of these, an antivirus programme is already installed on your computer. This is called Windows Defender which you should find in your control panel. If you suspect your computer has a virus, turn off immediately and call a computer person. **Ross MacDonald**

STARGAZING AT THE KAURI MUSEUM

June is shaping up to be a very busy month at The Kauri Museum with three events planned; all of them celebrating the stars and sky in different ways. On the shortest day, Wednesday 21 June, the Director of Planetarium North will be at Matakohe Hall for an evening's programme entitled "Clocks, Calendars and Compasses"; an exploration of the reasons we have seven days a week, why the metre is exactly so long, and many other aspects of daily life that originate from our place in Space. If the weather permits, there will be an opportunity for attendees to look at the night sky with expert guidance. So bring your own binoculars or telescopes and keep the fingers crossed! For several years The Kauri Museum has encouraged the seven primary schools in the old Otamatea district to participate in a students' art exhibition to mark Matariki. This year the theme of the exhibition is 'E Whitu ngā Whetu, ngā Rākau e Whitu: Seven Stars, Seven Trees". Each school has been assigned a whakataukī, or proverb, featuring one of seven native trees, to illustrate using any media, in any way. The students' work will be on display at the Museum from 26 June. Following closely after is the visit of Starlab Astronomy on 29 and 30 June. Starlab is a portable planetarium, described by some as a 'blow-up igloo'. Air is blown by a fan into a tunnel at one end which keeps the dome inflated. Students then crawl through an opening at the other end and sit on the floor inside the dome where the night sky is displayed.
