Council Long Term Plan Consultation

Every three years Council prepares what is called the Long Term Plan. It covers the next 10 years and what infrastructure and levels of service that Council proposes to provide to the community during that time. It also projects what sort of rating income would need to be collected to achieve those goals.

This Council's Long Term Plan Consultation Document will be available for you to review until early April (we haven't confirmed the dates at the time of writing this article). You can download a copy of the LTP Consultation Document from the Council website www.kaipara.govt.nz. You may also like to attend one of the many community consultation meetings that are planned around the district. Again the Council website will have a list of those and they will be publicised across local media.

The LTP is, in essence, a contract between Council and the community so it is important that you read the Consultation Document and provide your feedback. Once we confirm the LTP at the end of June then we are committed to delivering those projects and levels of service.

Small Community, Wonderful Services Available

Orrs Unichem Pharmacy Dargaville has been servicing the Ruawai Community for 12 years now from their Pharmacy Depot site on Freyberg Road, known to you all as 'Orrs Health and Beauty'. As you can imagine there are a lot of compliance issues with running a Pharmacy. Orrs have overcome these obstacles to provide the Ruawai Community with a comprehensive prescription supply service. This means once you've seen your Doctor, either in Ruawai or Dargaville, as long as you drop off your script to either pharmacy site before 1pm the team in Dargaville will then process and dispense your completed script. It is then sen back to the Ruawai depot ready for you to collect from 3pm the same day (providing the prescription does not need extra follow-up). Supporting local business ensures that both business and services are continued to be offered locally. Ruawai's an awesome rural community and we're blessed to have health services delivered locally in our town. The delivery of the Orrs Ruawai rural script service has been propped up by rural funding the last few years to assist with the costs involved in providing this service. Without this funding the service would be unviable. May I encourage you all to continue using and supporting all our local services. The Ruawai depot is open Monday to Friday from 9:30am to 4:30pm (with a brief closure for lunch at 1:45pm-2.15pm). It's closed on weekends/public holidays. Did you know that Orrs Unichem Pharmacy in Dargaville is open 365 days of the year? 9am to 1pm every Saturday. 10:30am to 12:30pm every Sunday. Normal weekday hours are 8:30am to 5:30pm and they are open 10am to 1pm on Statutory Holiday Weekdays.







Ruawai TokaToka War Memorial Hall

The Hall has undergone a number of renovations over the last few years and is now in renewed condition. The Meeting Room was the first project. The roof over this room had been leaking which caused a lot of damage. Next the Ladies Toilet block was totally redone. It looked guite shabby and some ladies were reluctant to use it at all. Next, the Hall Committee applied for and obtained a Lotteries Grant to put a new roof over a large part of the Hall and at the same time upgrade the kitchen which included the installation of a steriliser/dishwasher. Last year we were lucky enough to get another Grant which was used to renovate the Social Lounge (used to be called the

Supper room). It was completely refurbished and we had a air-conditioning unit installed for heating or cooling. A new stove in the kitchen replaced the old one which was unreliable. The kitchen has passed health inspection. The Hall Committee has organised the repainting of weathered and damaged portions on weather boards, doors and windows on the outside of the Hall. The outside was last painted in 2007. The Meeting Room is good for small meetings. The Social Lounge is used for larger meetings, dinners and birthday parties. It can seat up to 100 people for a meeting and at least 60 people for dining. The Disappearing 'Wows'





Greetings all. My husband, Ray Curle, and I stepped out from producing the Christian Life national news magazine in November. We've launched a service to help authors self-publish their books both in New Zealand and internationally on 39,000 online outlets. We've been so busy we're literally getting plastic burns from the keyboard over here! We're meeting so many interesting Kiwis with fascinating stories. We've recently re-released local Ruakaka resident, Neville de Villiers gripping memoir, *Doumar and the Doctor*, tracking his white-knuckle adventure sailing a 31ft sloop from England to NZ. We're helping Dutch ex-pat, Ingrid Coles from Havelock North publish her inspiring memoir, *Two Slices of Bread*, her story of surviving being interned in a Japanese concentration camp in Java at 3 months old. At three years old she and her surviving family members returned to Holland, then Ingrid immigrated to New Zealand to train as a nurse. What a story! Another fantastic book we've worked on is *The Unforgotten Babies* by Marina Young. She is the founder of the Buttons Project which helps support people affected by abortion. Check out www.wildsidepublishing.com/wsp-authors.html and see the excellent authors we've had the opportunity to help in some way, and their stunning books (under the Self-Publishing Help tab).

I'm pedal to the metal trying to get some space to get my next book, *Radical Lives Vol 2* to the printers. It's almost there! This is a collection of 19 fascinating Kiwi true stories to encourage and bring hope. Contributors include: Andrew Stroud - NZ motorcycle racing legend, Tania Butler - widow of Chris Crean who paid the ultimate price making a stand against gang violence in Taranaki (of the movie RESOLVE), Tuhoe 'Bruno' Isaac - ex-Mob leader of True Red, and ... well, you get the picture. Heaps of other legends.

We're getting more and more feedback from readers of *The Wild Side* as my memoir silently but surely permeates through society, including letters from prisoners who have been greatly encouraged. Check this out, just this week: "Some feedback regarding your books *Radical Lives* and *Wild Side*: They are being well received by the inmates at Mt Eden and are in high demand at the moment." Also, "I am writing to share how your book *(The Wild Side)* changed my life and really encouraged me during a very difficult time. Every day I read a chapter and I really looked forward to it despite other situations going on at the time & it gave me something to look forward to & helped my spiritual walk and fight." Makes the endless hours chained to the keyboard getting a writers tan worthwhile. Almost.

On a very different note, our healing and recovery initiative, the *Wild Side Trust* became a fully incorporated charitable trust and has been granted full charitable status. The *Wild Side Trust* is a communications hub helping connect people with the help they need, and is working towards seeing a new healing and recovery centre established in the Kaipara. What's the Real Estate Market Doing?

Residential sales in and around Ruawai have slowed down although the market is still quite active with 12 sales reported to REINZ in the past year as compared to 27 the previous year. Values have strengthened and most residential property owners found their new rateable valuations were lifted last year to reflect the lift in this market.

"Supply and demand" is having an effect on the dairy farm market, as there are a large number for sale and less interest from buyers. The average sale value of dairy farms per hectare is not much different than it was five years ago, although grazing land has lifted significantly in value over that period. From now through to winter is usually the most active time for the rural real estate market, so give me a call now if you are thinking of selling.

A Bit of Ruawai History

I do some volunteer work in the Collections Department of the Kauri Museum and I come across some interesting material. Just recently I noticed a booklet published by an Auckland firm in 1939/1940. It was a kind of travel guide. In it I found some interesting information about Ruawai in those days. As you can see it was quite a thriving community. I have heard about Shepherd's tearooms from some of our senior citizens and they were quite famous in those days. They were located on what is now Wharf Road, just before you get to the Ruawai Hall. That area was then the business centre of the town. The Picture Theatre was where Connections Real Estate, the accountant'a firm and Dargaville Vet Clinic are now. I have been told that the 'Central Garage' was located where the 4square supermarket is now.

When we came to Ruawai in 1974, there were two banks (BNZ & NATIONAI), three service stations (Shell, Caltex & BP), a panel beater shop, a men's clothing & shoe store, a high quality ladies fashion store, a hardware store, two electrical supplies shops, a butcher shop, two supermarkets plus a Post Office which was also the telephone exchange. Thankfully, Ruawai is still a thriving community even though there have been many changes.

RUAWAI.

Ruawai is the centre of a rich farming district. It may be reached from Auckland by service car, or by rail to Paparoa Station, thence by daily service car (19½ miles) by metalled road via Paparoa and Matakohe. It may also be reached by regular steamer from Helensville or Dargaville.

Ruawai is quite a business centre, with post-office, District High School, several stores, two garages, boarding-houses, baker, butcher, picture-theatre with dancing floor, public hall, two banks, etc. There are excellent tea-rooms opposite the postoffice. The principal industry is dairying, there being a large factory near the township.

There are Tennis, Croquet and Athletic clubs. Also ladies'

rest-room and a branch of the Plunket Society.

Lodge Ruawai, 207 (Masonic) meets monthly.

TOKATOKA.

Tokatoka was the first European settlement on the Wairoa. It lies on the main road between Dargaville and Paparoa, service cars passing through each way daily. It is about 22½ miles from Paparoa by road and 10¾ miles from Dargaville. Steamers call in on their way from Helensville. The township lies near the foot of Tokatoka Mountain, t
